The Summer Term has been full of excitement, confidence, learning and fun for our very special Edonians who have risen to the challenge of end of year exams in all year groups, have fasted through the month of Ramadhan keeping their spiritual growth and commitment to learning in tandem, seen a midway completion of GCSE courses for Year 9 in ICT, R.E. and delivered a tremendous win for the school by a Year 7 team- S-MART who have won the Mosaic National Enterprise Challenge having competed against 100's of other schools up and down the country. Not only are we very pleased with this achievement; as a school community we hope that it signals the beginning of great things to come!

This July, the school will complete its second year since its start and in September will grow again to accept new members to its family. 100 new students will begin their educational journey with us and are very fortunate to have gained admissions at Eden which is fast becoming the school of choice in the local community mashallah. As the school expands and grows, we will also see the development of the building programme enter phase 3. In September we will at last have specialist Science facilities so that we can continue to offer a better provision and accommodate all our new students.

In October we will then transfer from this building into the building next door- Landmark House which will be our temporary accommodation again within our permanent site. There will be a specialist Art room, a Food Technology room, a new dining hall, specialist ablution facilities and a reflection hall for prayers. As you can see, each year the accommodation will improve to sustain the delivery of educational excellence until the building is completed in 2018. Though it appears it is a long way away, in reality time will pass by very quickly! In the meantime we anticipate that our Edonians will become even better learners as they benefit from a building that is designed to meet their educational requirements.

MOSAIC ENTERPRISE CHALLENGE

BUSINESS – MONEY, FINANCE AND MARKETING: BORING, RIGHT?
WRONG.

Believe me when I say, if you asked me a month ago whether I would ever consider a career in business, I would have - quite honestly- laughed in your face. Now all that has changed. After weeks of being surrounded by pitches and business plans, I have come to realise there is more to this field of work.

Let's begin with Mosaic. What does this project even do? Well, this foundation, which promotes 'The Power of Positive Thinking' aims to inspire and provide opportunities to children nationwide. One way it does this is by organizing an annual enterprise challenge for secondary school students to harness their inner entrepreneur and create a company. Time for me to share my experience.



Regionals

Here's the trouble: no matter how prepared you are, you always feel unprepared. After around 20 minutes of circling the venue unknowingly (and realizing it was only a street away from our original position), we entered the EY Building in Canary Wharf. Practicing for the last time was surreal.

Was I really going to perform the pitch I had been rehearsing for weeks?

If I recall correctly, Ms Hassan and our mentor were actually more anxious than we were. Weird. The itinerary was such: a formal introduction by Afshan Azad, the actress who played Padma Patil, in the *Harry Potter* series; a guest speaker; and then the start of the team presentations.



The other groups were good... very good... scarily good.

'Please welcome Team S-MART, representing Eden Girls' School', Afshan said. After walking up to the stage, we were standing in front of a packed room of people. We started the pitch. Whilst S-MART refused to make eye contact with the judges out of complete and utter fear, our pitch went smoothly.

A few more guest speakers and a painfully long speech later, the winners were announced.



We won.

Nationals

The Hogan and Lovells building in Central London was intimidating, as were the opposing teams inside it. This time we got an hour to play the simulation, and get the highest score we could and then half an hour to practice our pitch. After a quick tour S-MART were led to the auditorium - where we would perform in mere minutes. It was mainly the same sequence as regionals, but just grander: including more speakers and speeches.

To our astonishment, we were crowned to be the winners of Mosaic, making us the **youngest winners the competition's ever had**. The recognition we got after was intense- photographers, camera crews and a constant buzz around us.



Prizes (the fun part!)

As the winners we were awarded an assortment of prizes- medals, trophies, laptops, a helicopter ride, boat tours, high tea at Harrods, riding in Rolls Royces and goody bags. There was a trip to Downing Street, a tour of Clarence house (Private residence of HRH Prince Charles) and Houses of Parliament, which could only be described as a once in a lifetime opportunity.

SUFFRAGETTES WORKSHOP

It was period 3 on a Monday, and after a morning full of work, the Year 9s walked into their History classroom, expecting another regular lesson, only to be met by a woman dressed in the traditional clothes worn in in the early 1900s, including a sash with the phrase

“VOTES FOR WOMEN”

printed boldly across it. Seated in chairs arranged around the guest, many were mystified as to what the session would entail.

The lady began to speak, introducing herself as a Suffragette living in 1918, and it became clear that she was role playing as a woman campaigning for votes for women, all the way from the early 20th century. She entranced the class with her acting,



passionately educating the class on a subject most had believed would never hold their interest.

She spoke about the injustices women, (who were simply fighting for their rights) faced, narrating it as a Suffragette herself. Her tales of suffering and inequality were haunting: many women were imprisoned during marches, protesting for the vote, some were cruelly force fed in prison. There were women who were even banned from seeing their own children after finally leaving jail.

However, her story did end on a positive note. After 1928 all women were given equal voting rights to men and were finally given their voice.

It was an experience Year 9 are unlikely to forget, and it sparked a newfound curiosity and interest in History and the Suffragettes.

FUNDRAISING AT EDEN 15/16

This year Eden has been fundraising every half term for different causes in the UK and Internationally. Over the course of the year we have supported at least nine different causes and we have already exceeded last year's total and the year has not even come to an end. The single largest amount raised was for UCLH Presents for Children appeal which raised the equivalent of £2,805 in gifts. The introduction of the Sadaqah buckets in Ramadhāan for each form in Hub colours saw the second largest amount raised which is £1,710.94 so far. Students have taken well to the idea of giving in small amounts regularly for nothing in return. Based on the success of the Sadaqah buckets and recommendations of the students – we are hoping to make them a permanent fixture in each form room. In the month of Ramadhāan we have raised a total of £2,345.94. Thus, so far we have raised £9,262 over this year.

On the 8th of June Eden held the final workshop with Social Fabric @mystudio5. Pupils got to plan, design and create prints using a technique called mono printing.



Spirituality at Eden

Sometimes, it is quite amazing just to put Allah, the Exalted, in the context of the world and how dependant we are on him. I peer in amazement when I see people jumping from bus to bus and platform to platform in order to carry out their day to day affairs. Take the example of an individual who pushes the 'stop' button on a bus, the 'ting!' sound rings and every person getting off the bus has a different concern on their mind. Some are wondering whether they will be late, others are happy they are on time, and a few are figuring out how to bide their time if they are early. Quite simply, every individual on the face of this earth has a different worry on their mind.

Now, let's put all of this into the context of Allah, the Exalted, as our Lord. He mentions in the Verse of the Throne,
"Allah, there is no God but He; the Living, the All Sustaining." [2:255]

The word al-Qayyum (translated here as All Sustaining) has been defined by the commentators of the Qur'an as 'that being who not only sustains himself but sustains others as well'. When we consider ourselves and our day to day lives, we are only responsible for sustaining those around us. Parents will focus their attention on the upbringing of their children and likewise, faithful offspring look to care for their parents when they are elderly. Others may be sole breadwinners within their respective homes and others may be responsible for groups of people. The reality is that our scope of maintaining and looking after others is limited. Depending on our role within our family and community, we may only look after the interests of a handful of people on a day to day basis.

Bearing this preamble in mind, I only truly understood this feature of Allah, as 'al-Qayyum', whilst I was travelling. There are billions of people around the world, each with a different worry or concern but it is Allah, the Exalted, who is sustaining them with sustenance of various kinds. It is for this reason that the Prophet Zakariyyah (may peace be upon him) supplicated to Allah, the Almighty, for offspring despite his old age. He implored,

"My Lord, I am in a state that bones in my body have turned feeble, and the head has flared up grey with old age, and I never remained, My Lord, unanswered in my prayer to You. I fear (my) kinsmen after me, and my wife is barren, so bless me with an heir..." [19:4]

The reason why he had supplicated for a child in this manner was because he had observed that Maryam, who was in his care, was being nourished with fresh fruit despite it being the winter months. When he enquired as to where she had ascertained such sustenance, she replied,

"It is from Allah. Surely Allah gives to whom He wills without measure." [3:37]

It was then that he pondered that if fruits can be granted out of season, such is the case for his offspring. Despite having aged considerably, and his wife being barren, he supplicated to 'al-Qayyum' who accepted his prayer and brought forth a child for him.

We should also regularly supplicate to Him,

"Verily your Lord is the One, Modest and Generous, and when His servant raises his hands to Him in supplication, He is diffident (in some wordings, shy or hesitant) from returning them empty." [at-Tirmidhi]


 **Kansas, USA**

It was Leadership Day...again! However, this time, some of us got to go on a trip, while others participated in various, fun activities.



- 1.- Rio 2016 will be the first time in Olympic history that a South American country has hosted the Games. The city won its bid in 2009, beating out Chicago, Madrid and Tokyo.
- 2 - The torch relay will begin on April 21 in the Games birthplace — Olympia in Greece — before travelling across Brazil for more than 90 days and finishing in Rio on August 5. While in Greece, it will pass through the Eloenas refugee camp near Athens, where one resident will be selected as a torch bearer.
3. Around 10,500 athletes from 206 countries are expected to take part in 17 days of the Olympiad, competing across 306 events.
4. The mascot for 2016 is "Vinicius," a yellow and blue creature representing Brazilian wildlife.
5. There are 7.5 million tickets, with prices ranging from \$40 for some swimming events to almost \$3,000 for the best seats at the opening ceremony.
6. Team USA took 556 athletes to the London 2012 Olympics, second only to the hosts, and is again expected to bring more athletes than all the other visiting nations in Rio.
