Secondary School Pupil Premium Funding Report 2017/18 and 2018/19

This statement is updated in October and February of each year, following the publication of the league tables. The next update will be in February 2019.

Name of School	Eden Girls Waltham Forest
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The pupil premium is additional funding for publicly funded schools in England to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils of all abilities and to close the gaps between them and their peers.

How much pupil premium funding did the school receive in 2017/18 and how many pupils were eligible for support through this fund?

For the Pupil Premium, the school will receive £203948 in 2017-18. This reflected the number of students who are from disadvantaged backgrounds.

What were the reasons for these spending decisions?

Using the Pupil Premium funds, the school aims to:

- Maximise the % of students from disadvantaged backgrounds who achieve a 'strong pass' or at least a 'standard pass' in English and Maths. Nationally, only around a third of such students achieve a 'standard pass' and around a quarter achieve a 'strong pass' at GCSE in both English and Maths.
- Maximise the % of students from disadvantaged backgrounds who participate fully in the subjects needed for the English Baccalaureate and who go on to achieve the English Baccalaureate. Nationally, only around 10% of such students achieve the English Baccalaureate.

What strategies have been used to monitor and evaluate the impact of pupil premium funding?

To monitor and evaluate the impact of pupil premium funding, the school:

- Formally assesses students in each subject at least once every half-term.
- Closely tracks and analyses the progress of students on a half-termly basis.
- Reports to the Trust Central Office and the Local Governing Body regularly on the performance of disadvantaged students.

What difference did the use of pupil premium funding make to outcomes for supported pupils in 2017/18?

This is our first year of GCSE results.

In 2018, the school achieved the following outcomes with students from disadvantaged backgrounds:

The Pupil Premium allows us to focus our resources more effectively on those students who are most likely to fail to achieve due to their socio-economic background.

In particular, this has led to the school achieving outstanding progress for its students who come from disadvantaged backgrounds.

- EGWF is one of the best schools in the country for results by students from disadvantaged backgrounds and with low prior achievement from primary school.
- In 2018, 89% of students from disadvantaged backgrounds achieved 9-4, and 89% achieved 9-5, in English and Maths, well above national rates. Nationally, around a third

of students from disadvantaged backgrounds achieve 9-4 in English and Maths, 40% such students who achieve 9-5 in English and Maths.

- In addition:
 - 88% of all students achieved grades 9-4 and 76% achieved grades 9-5 in English and Maths well above the national rate of 40%.
 - 42% of all students achieved the English Baccalaureate in 2018, compared to around 20% nationally.
 - In 2018, the 'Attainment 8' score, which reflects the average grade across eight academically challenging subjects of 59.49. The national score is 44.3. This puts the school in the second percentile in the country.
 - The 'Average EBacc' score is 5.6 well above the national score of 3.8 and local authority score of 4.8.
 - The 'Progress 8' score for 2018 will be confirmed in January 2019, but is estimated to be around +1.3 the 12th highest value added score nationally. This puts the school in the first percentile in the country.
 - In 2018, 89% of disadvantaged students entered the English Baccalaureate, with 56% achieving the measure (based on needing 9-5 in English and Maths). Nationally, around a tenth of such students achieve the E Bacc measure.
 - In 2018, 94% of all students were entered for the English Baccalaureate well above the national rate of 35%.
- Students make outstanding progress in literacy.
 - In 2018, 94% of students achieved a 'standard pass' (Grade 4+) and 86% achieved a 'strong pass' (Grade 5+) in English.
- Students make outstanding progress in numeracy.
 - In 2018, 88% of students achieved a 'standard pass' (Grade 4+) and 78% achieved a 'strong pass' (Grade 5+) in Maths.
- The average Science Value Added score is +1.3 and the average Humanities Value Added score is +1.7 putting the school in the top first percentile nationally.

How much pupil premium funding has the school received for 2018/19?

What are the main barriers to future success for pupils in school who are eligible for pupil premium funding (including for those pupils who are most able)?

In-school barriers

- 35% of disadvantaged Y7s have KS2 Reading scores below 100.
 - 19% of disadvantaged Y7s have KS2 Reading scores above 110.
 - 27% of disadvantaged Y7s have KS2 Maths scores below 100.
 - 15% of disadvantaged Y7s have KS2 Maths scores above 110.
- 31% of disadvantaged Y8s have KS2 Reading scores below 100.
 - 17% of disadvantaged Y8s have KS2 Reading scores above 110.
 - 19% of disadvantaged Y8s have KS2 Maths scores below 100.
 - 22% of disadvantaged Y8s have KS2 Maths scores above 110.
- 40% of disadvantaged Y9s have KS2 Reading scores below 100.
 - 13% of disadvantaged Y9s have KS2 Reading scores above 110.
 - 33% of disadvantaged Y9s have KS2 Maths scores below 100.
 - 11% of disadvantaged Y9s have KS2 Maths scores above 110.
- 6% of disadvantaged Y10s have KS2 Reading levels below level 4.
 - 37% of disadvantaged Y10s have KS2 Reading levels at or above level 5.
 - 10% of disadvantaged Y10s have KS2 Maths levels below level 4.
 - 41% of disadvantaged Y10s have KS2 Maths levels at or above level 5.
- 7% of disadvantaged Y11s have KS2 Reading levels below level 4.
 - 50% of disadvantaged Y11s have KS2 Reading levels at or above level 5.
 - 5% of disadvantaged Y11s have KS2 Maths levels below level 4.
 - 48% of disadvantaged Y11s have KS2 Maths levels at or above level 5.
- Progress 8 score of disadvantaged students at Eden WF in 2018 = +1.63
 - Progress 8 score of all students at Eden WF in 2018 = +1.28
- In 2018, 89% of disadvantaged students at EGWF achieved grades 9-4 and 89% achieved grades 9-5 in English and Maths. These corresponding figures were 88% and 76% respectively for all students.

External barriers

96% of students have English as an Additional Language.

76% of students come from areas which are in the top 30% most deprived areas (IDACI).

What are the key objectives of the Pupil Premium strategy at the school?

Using the Pupil Premium funds, the school aims to:

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- Maximise the % of students from disadvantaged backgrounds who participate fully in the subjects needed for the English Baccalaureate and who go on to achieve the English Baccalaureate.
